### What is Salus?



- Salus is a provider of supportive housing for adults with serious mental illness and concurrent challenges including addictions, homelessness and cycles of hospitalization
- Salus is a mental health service provider offering:
  - Case Management
  - Community Development
  - · Transitional Housing Programs
  - Occupational Therapy
  - · Wellness and Recreation Programming



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### **On-site Supports**

- Salus Community Developers provide on-site support to tenants through resource centres located in four Salus supportive housing buildings, and in three Ottawa Community Housing (OCH) communities
- Community Developers provide:
  - Crisis Intervention: Including suicide intervention, stabilizing tenant relation issues, and assisting with tenant health and housing crises
  - Ongoing Support: Talking to tenants, identifying and encouraging community leadership, and connecting tenants with community or internal supports
  - Community Development: Organizing tenant activities, developing self help or skill development groups, linking with community activities, promoting tenant run meetings, encouraging tenants to build on strengths, exploring recreational activities and promoting healthy lifestyles





## Supports to Social Housing Program

- A City of Ottawa funded initiative where five support agencies partner with social housing providers to provide supports and housing for people with histories of homelessness and/or who are at risk of becoming homeless
- Salus supports 36 clients with mental health and/or addiction issues, who are at risk of losing their housing within 3 Ottawa Community Housing communities – MacLaren Towers, Regina Towers and Lepage Manor






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
### SSH Program Goals

- To address the needs of OCH tenants at risk of homelessness due to issues related to severe and persistent mental illness and/or concurrent disorders
- To ensure housing is maintained and stabilized and that the tenant does not experience homelessness and other harmful consequences associated with unsupported addictions and mental health issues


