Describe the role of medical and psychological triage in relief efforts.

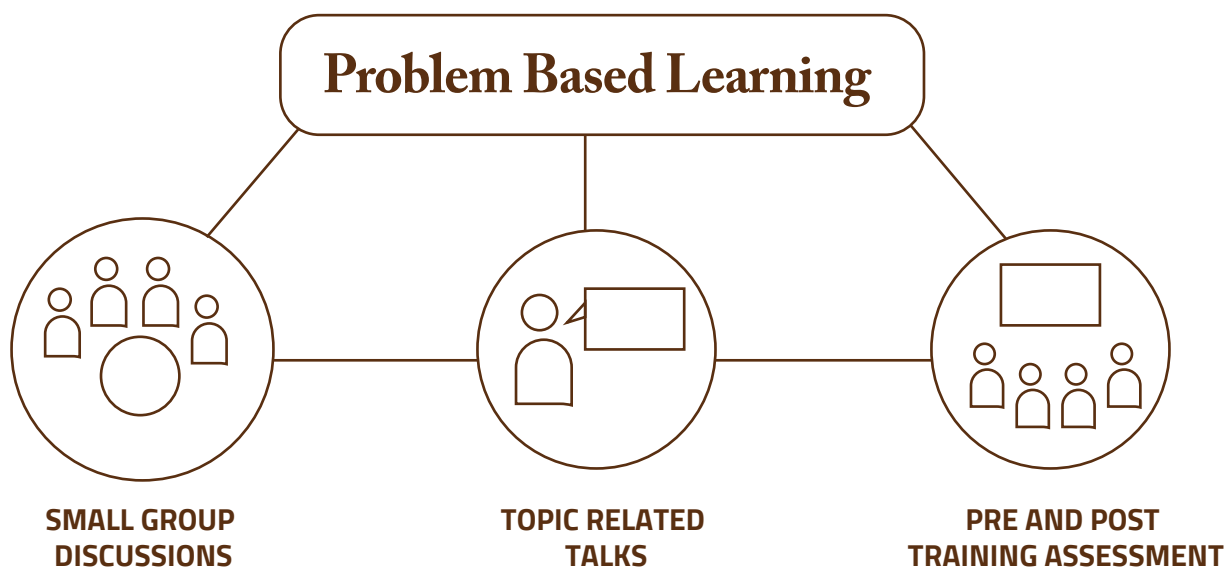
Demonstrate critical thinking and problem-solving skills when working on a relief team.
