

Marc Brown, bestselling children's author and illustrator, is the creator of Arthur (a lovable but occasionally fussy bespectacled aardvark) and the Arthur Adventure Series.

While growing up in Erie, PA, with his three sisters, Brown was told many stories by his grandmother, Thora. This inspired Brown to write stories of his own in the later years of his life. It was Grandma Thora who also fueled Brown's penchant for drawing, which was discovered at the age of six. Eventually, his high school art teacher, Nancy Bryan, introduced him to watercolors, which he now uses for the majority of his illustrations. With the help of his Grandma Thora, Brown was able to major in graphic design at the Cleveland Institute of Art.

"When my first son, Tolon, was born, I started telling him stories. One night our story was about an aardvark who disliked his nose. The aardvark was named Arthur, and that story became Arthur's Nose." What began as a simple family ritual soon grew into a full-time profession.

Now, more than twenty-five years later, Arthur is the star of a series of bestselling books. The series has numerous spin-offs and now has almost 70 million books in print in the United States alone.

Marc is the executive producer of Arthur, winner of six Emmy Awards and now the longest running children's animated show in television history. "Us plus Them": Aligning 0-5 and K-12 to Close Early Achievement Gaps

Quality early learning experiences have long been seen as the foundation for later school success. However, despite years of increased investment in PreK, the United States continues to see persistent achievement gaps. Dr. Kauerz will provide an overview of the Framework for Planning, Implementing, and Evaluating PreK-3rd Grade Approaches and offer insights into how comprehensive and effective P-3 approaches expand our understanding of "early learning" to include both 0-5 and K-3. She will share how P-3 requires intentional and systematic linking and aligning with new partners and across familiar boundaries to make meaningful improvements that benefit young children and close early achievement gaps. You will leave with a clearer conceptual understanding of P-3, as well as a practical understanding of your role in this work.

Kristie Kauerz, Ed.D. is Research Assistant Professor of P-3 Policy and Leadership at the University of Washington (UW) and specializes in education reform efforts that address the continuum of learning from birth through 3rd grade. Kristie's expertise spans policy, research, and practice as well as birth-to-five systembuilding and K-12 reform.

Kristie's expertise is based in her work with more than 40 states and dozens of school districts around the country. Kristie's experience includes work at the state level, as an early childhood and P-3 policy advisor for two former Colorado governors — Bill Ritter, Jr. and Roy Romer; at the national level, as program director for early learning at Education Commission of the States; and in academia as director of a PreK-3rd Grade Initiative at Harvard Graduate School of Education and as a research fellow at the National Center for Children and Families (Teachers College, Columbia University) Kauerz is the lead author on the Framework for Planning, Implementing, and Evaluating PreK-3rd Grade Approaches, a tool to guide school, district, community, and state efforts. She also has authored and co-authored numerous articles, book chapters, and reports on topics ranging from state kindergarten policies to early childhood governance to P-3 policy alignment.
