
Trust & familiarity as predictors of sexual risk behaviour

- Prior acquaintance, trust, and previous sex are associated with likelihood to engage in condomless sex, including with casual partners.
- On the other hand, Seroconversion Study finds that men recently infected with HIV are much less likely to have any prior contact with the man they believe had infected them.



'Safe sex' & male sex work

- As with female sex workers, most evidence has suggested that risky sex was uncommon in the context of male sex work & most men used condoms with clients
- This appeared to be less true of their private sexual encounters & relationships
- Some male sex workers appeared similar to other gay & bisexual men at increased risk of HIV infection.



Hook Up study

- Funded by NSW and Queensland Health to assess levels of risk & access to services among male sex workers.
- Conducted in partnership with ACON & SWOP in NSW and with RESPECT in Queensland.
- To include informal & irregular sex work as well as ongoing professional sex work, we conducted broad-based online survey of gay & bisexual men, specifically targeting sex workers
 - Sample included occasional & 'opportunistic' sex workers, professional sex workers, their clients, past sex workers, & men who had never done sex work.
- Supplemented by qualitative interviews.



Participant Numbers

Total completed the questionnaire	734 (100%)
Recent sex work	104 (14%)
Any sex work ever	152 (21%)
Non sex workers	582 (78%)
Recent clients of sex workers	113 (15%)



Demographics

Sex workers were younger & less likely to be employed in higher status positions. Also less likely to be of anglo-celtic background. They scored higher on sexual sensation-seeking.



Sexual relationships

- Condomless sex in previous 6 months*	38	29
Fuckbuddies*	74	64
- Condomless sex in previous 6 months*	53	34
Casual partners	81	80
- Condomless sex in previous 6 months*	56	35

Sex workers tended to have similar kinds of sexual relationships to non sex workers – although they were somewhat more inclined to have fuckbuddies.

Sex workers were more likely to engage in condomless sex with all partner types (see poster).

Majority did not engage in sex work regularly.

Few relied on sex work as their main income.

Many clients were regulars, and did not know HIV status of about half.

A third engaged in condomless sex.

43% reported condomless sex with clients in the previous six months




Predictors of condomless sex with most recent client

Client said he was HIV-negative	4.12 (1.45-11.70)	0.008	

Condomless sex with clients was associated only with engaging in condomless sex with casual partners, sensation-seeking, & client indicating he was HIV-negative.

Factors not associated with condomless sex with client included: Mental health (see poster) Frequency of, or financial reliance on, sex work Prior contact with client



Summary

- Sex work was often not the primary source of income.
- Mostly, sex workers were similar to, though younger than, other GBM.
 - Sex workers tended to have elevated levels of sexual risk behaviour
 - And this was also reflected in sex with clients.
- Sex workers were also more sexually adventurous.
 Commonly, sex workers had repeated interactions with clients
- About half did not know their clients' HIV status.
- Sexual risk behaviour with clients tends to be related to factors such as being more sexually adventurous, and knowledge of their clients' HIV status.
