# CONFERENCE SPEAKERS



DVM, University of Sasckatchewan BSc in Pathogenic Microbiology, University of Alberta Residency in Medical Oncology, Colorado State University MS in Comparative Oncology, Colorado State University

Dr Vail's research involves the design and implementation of comparative oncology clinical trials through the inclusion of companion animal dogs and cats with spontaneous tumors. These spontaneous tumors have similar biological behavior as their counterparts in humans. The information obtained from these clinical trials help inform both the design of future trials in humans as well as provide preliminary data on ongoing drug development programs for animal health.

Dr Vail has published over 120 peer-reviewed scientific manuscripts and 50 book chapters in the field of veterinary and comparative oncology. David is co-editor of the textbook Small Animal Clinical Oncology, past North American Journal Editor for Veterinary and Comparative Oncology, President of the Canine Comparative Oncology and Genomics Consortium (CCOGC) and a founding member of the Comparative Oncology Trials Consortium (COTC).



BVSc FANZCVS (Canine Medicine) DACVIM (Oncology, Small Animal Internal Medicine) Clinical Specialist in Oncology

Dr Bennett is a graduate of the University of Melbourne. After time in general practice he completed residency training in small animal medicine in 1999 and then joined the faculty of Purdue University in Indiana where he was trained in oncology.

He is a Fellow of the Australian and New Zealand College of Veterinary Scientists (Canine Medicine) and a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine (Oncology, Small Animal Internal Medicine).



Emily is a Registered Psychologist with the Australian Practitioners' Health Association (APRHA) and an Associated Member of the Australian Psychological Society (AMAPS).

At present, Emily works in a psychology practice Sydney's CBD.

Emily benefits from her experience of working under high pressure and tight deadlines as an ABC radio and TV journalist. She also worked at executive level of Government with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in Canberra.

She has a particular interest in developing resilience to overcome pressure situations and the stresses of working life. Wellness and wellbeing are an important part of this process.

Recently, Emily has been introduced to the veterinary profession and has recognised some of the unique problems that veterinarians deal with especially in the early years after graduation.

Like all of us she is appalled by the high incidence of mental illness in the veterinary profession and the alarming rate of suicide.

We feel that the mental health session is one of the most important sessions of the conference and we encourage everyone to attend.
