Workshop A	What is the purpose of colleges? Andrew Thomson, Director, Excellence First Enterprise Consultancy Focusing on colleges inventing success, generating socio- economic prosperity in partnership and encouraging innovation.
Workshop B	What does the future of learning look like? Karen Corbett, HM Inspector of Education, Education Scotland Moving forwardWhat will we mean by learning and teaching in the future?
