



A collector of patterned papers, magazine photos, sketches, bits of ephermera, vocabulary words and quotes, awardwinning author/illustrator, Judy Schachner, will share her process for creating books for children. It is a no pressure process that will inspire students to think outside the box and have fun with all kinds of writing projects.

Judy Schachner was born into an Irish Catholic working class family from New England. Money was as tight as their apartment was tiny and though she may not have had the easiest of childhoods, she credits her imagination with helping her survive it.

She can't ever remember a time when she was not drawing and like most budding artists she doodled on everything, including her father's bald head. She drew herself into stories where she was the smartest in her class and into a family where mothers lived to be a ripe old age.

Described by the New York Times as " ... something like the James Joyce for the elementary school – set...", Judy Schachner is the #1 NY Times Best Selling Author/Illustrator of over 25 books for children including Dewey Bob, Bits & Pieces, the Skippyjon Jones series, Yo Vikings, The Grannyman and Willy and May. 




