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# Victoria's Energy Efficiency and Productivity work program

- Energy Efficiency and Productivity Statement (June 2015)
  - Presented the Victorian Government's vision to save energy, grow jobs, protect the environment, and transition to an energy efficient economy.
  - Contained priorities for action:
    1. Buildings
    2. Vulnerable Households
    3. Businesses
    4. Government Leadership
    5. Markets (incl. VEET)
    6. Energy Efficiency Jobs
  - Underpins an Energy Efficiency and Productivity Strategy (under development, due mid-2016)



# Energy Efficiency and Energy Productivity

- Both are input/output metrics – but different

	<b>Input</b>	<b>Output</b>
<b>Energy Productivity</b>	Primary energy	GDP
<b>Energy Efficiency</b>	Energy at meter	Value more broadly

- Complementary, but appropriate for different purposes

# Development of the forthcoming Strategy

- Long-term path to lift energy efficiency and productivity, and to embed it in our decision making and investments
- Comprehensive and integrated approach to energy efficiency and productivity across sectors
- Measures in the Strategy will be selected based on:
  - Transparent criteria
  - Stakeholder input on priorities, including at a major Energy Efficiency and Productivity Summit hosted by Minister for Energy & Resources in August 2015.
