What is CEP?

Community Eligibility Provision

Background

- **Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010**
- **Provides an alternative to household applications for free and reduced price meals**
- **Offers all students free meals in high poverty Local Education Agency areas**



Community Eligibility Provision

Intent

- To improve access to free school meals in eligible high poverty LEAs and schools
- To eliminate administrative burden of collecting household applications

Community Eligibility Provision

Am I Eligible for CEP?

- Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) requires a minimum of 40 percent identified students in schools
 - single campus
 - a group of campuses
 - or entire contracting entity
 - as of April 1 of the prior year of implementation

Community Eligibility Provision

How does it Work? Participation Requirements

- CEs or school electing CEP must offer lunch and breakfasts at no charge to all enrolled students for a cycle of up to 4 years.
- Only count & report total reimbursable lunches and breakfasts served to students daily.
- Do not collect household applications

Community Eligibility Provision

- **March 20th – CEP Report in TXUNPS**
- **May 1st – TDA publishes list of eligible CEs and schools on Squaremeals.**
- **June 30th – CEs must have completed their application to participate in the TX-UNPS**

Community Eligibility Provision

Decision Time

- Report the identified student and enrollment numbers, by site, to TDA by April 1st.
- Analyze the data and business options to decide what would be best for business and best for the CN program.
- Fill out the application in TX-UNPS.
- Follow the regulations

Community Eligibility Provision

Financial Responsibility

- The CEP claiming percentage is the amount that can be claimed at the federal free rate.
- It is determined by multiplying the identified student percentage (ISP) by a multiplier factor established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (currently 1.6).
- Ex: ISP 62.5% X 1.6 USDA Factor = 100% Free Rate

Community Eligibility Provision

Evaluation

- Current and Expected Reimbursements
- $ADP \times \text{Free, Reduced, Paid} = \text{Total Amount of Reimbursement}$
- $ADP \times \text{ISP Free, Paid} = \text{Total amount of Reimbursement}$
- Compare the two amounts to create a baseline financial impact

Community Eligibility Provision

Approval Process

- The State agency would be required to confirm the LEAs eligibility to participate in CEP
- USDA requires the State agency to review documentation submitted by the LEA to ensure that :
 - **Requirements are met**
 - **Statistical Analysis Worksheet (SAW) is completed**

Community Eligibility Provision

SAW

- Prevents incorrect claims for reimbursement
- Will prevent over payments to CE
- Prevent CE from having to pay back over claims due to erroneous percentage

Community Eligibility Provision

General Procedures

- LEAs must notify TDA no later than June 30th of the school year prior to the first year of electing CEP
- A new identified student percentage may be established each year of the four year cycle for use in the following year
- There is an escape clause
- If an LEA elects to stop CEP, then standard meal counting and claiming is restored

Community Eligibility Provision

Considerations

- Plan for issues surrounding the absence of eligibility data
- Identify those internal departments that would need this data for other purposes
- Consider the participation by individual schools, groups of schools or the entire LEA

Definitions

- Identified Students
- Enrolled Students

Community Eligibility Provision

Eligibility, List, and Match

- TDA in cooperation with HHSC and the TEA
- provides an automated list of students whose households qualify for (SNAP), (TANF), Medicaid Free, Medicaid Reduced.
- Updated data is available at the beginning of the month - usually the 5th day of the month.
 - **TEXAS ELMS** *formerly knows as DC*

Community Eligibility Provision

Eligibility, List, and Match

- Other Categories include:
 - Designated state or federally funded pre-kindergarten programs
 - Early Head Start
 - Even Start and
 - Head Start
 - Homeless
 - including runaways and individuals displaced by declared disasters

Community Eligibility Provision

There are 2 eligibility types for CEP Identified Students

1. Directly Certified SNAP student
2. Directly Certified Students for the following programs:

CEP, cont

TANF

FDPIR

Medicaid Free (Medicaid reduced cannot be included)

DCE (directly certified by extension)

Early literacy programs;

**head start, early head start, even start,
state funded pre kindergarten program**

Community Eligibility Provision

Identified Student Percentage

Identified Student % =

$$\frac{\text{\# of Identified students}}{\text{Total \# of enrolled students with access to NSLP/SBP}} \times 100$$

Example:

{500 Identified Students / 1,000 Total # enrolled } * 100 = 50% -
this is the identified student percentage

Community Eligibility Provision

Claiming Percentages

- Identified student percentage multiplied by a factor of 1.6 equals the % of total meals served reimbursed at the Federal free rate
- The remaining % of total meals is reimbursed at the Federal paid rate
- Any meal costs in excess of the total Federal reimbursement must be covered through non-Federal sources

Community Eligibility Provision

Where did the 1.6 come from?

- Analysis showed that on average for every 10 identified students there were 6 more students certified based on an income application.
- Once the CE begins a four year CEP cycle, the multiplier stays in effect for the cycle.
- This is based on the average and USDA sets the limit

Community Eligibility Provision

Quiz:

What identified student percent equates to 100% of the enrollment being eligible to claim meals at the free reimbursement rate?

62.5%

$$(62.5 * 1.6) = 100\%$$

Community Eligibility Provision

Updating the Claiming Percentages

Updating the Claiming Percentages

A new identified student percentage may be established each year

 During the 2nd, 3rd and 4th years, the CE/school may select the higher of the identified student percentage from the original year's data, or

 They can establish a new percent using the most recent April 1 data.

Community Eligibility Provision

Benefits of CEP

- Increases access to school meals for children in high poverty areas .
- Increases overall program participation.
- Eliminates administrative burden of collecting household applications.
- Reduces chance of overt identification.
- Eliminates the administrative burden of verification.
- Requires no base year data collection like other provisions do.

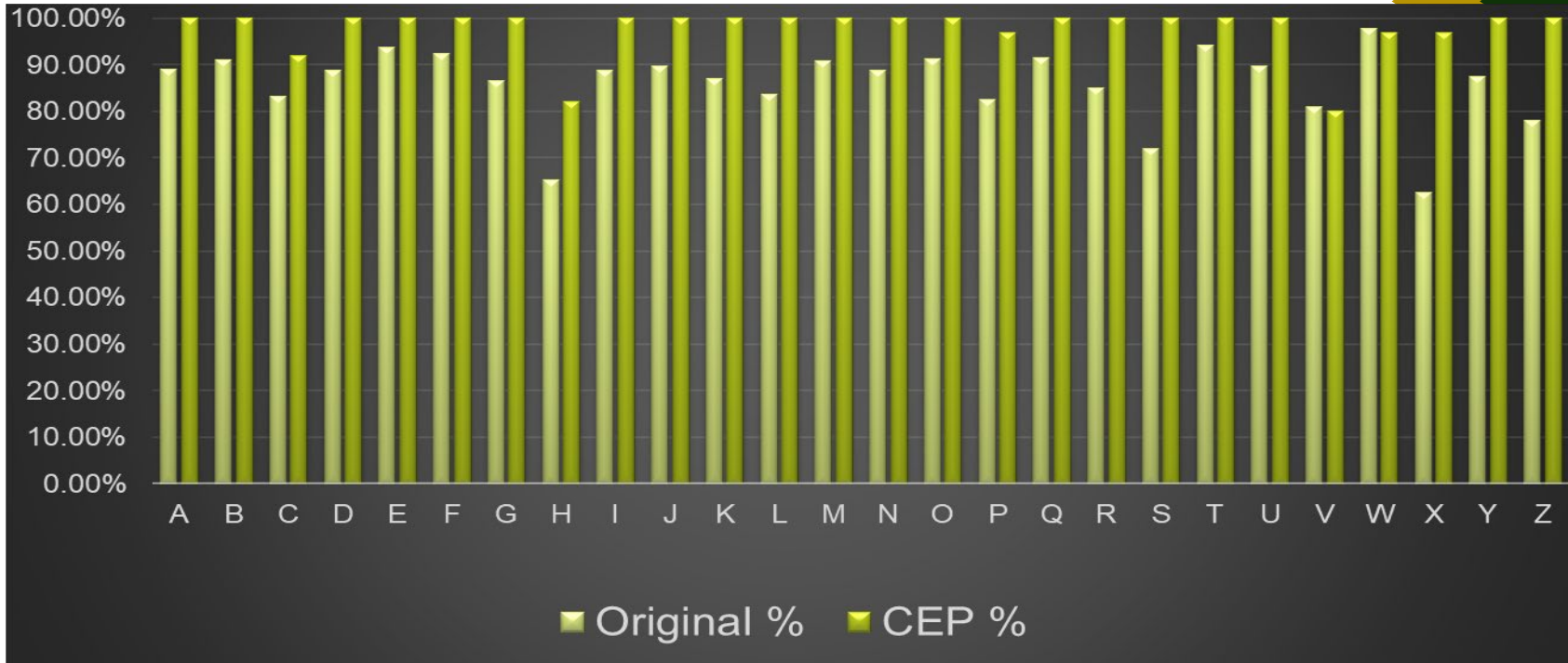

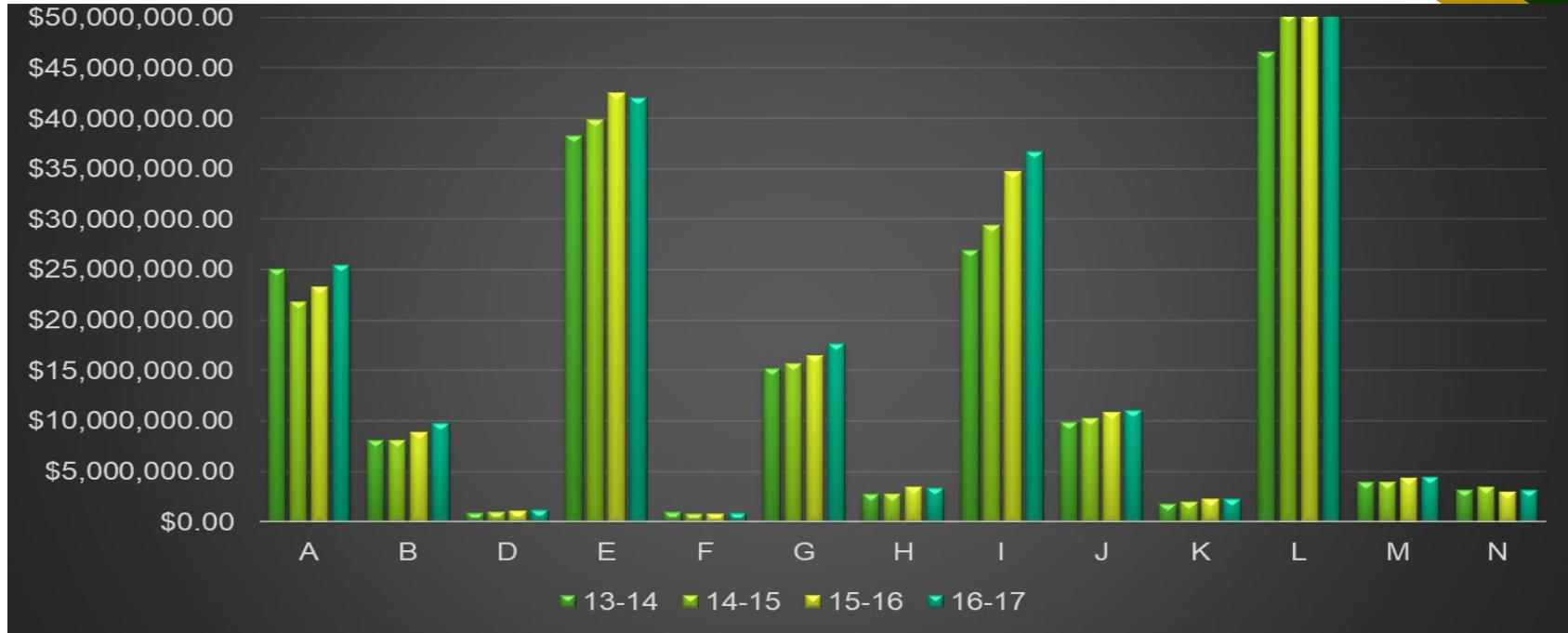

The State of Texas will be implementing what is known as the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) beginning with the 2014–2015 school year. The CEP is related to child nutrition programs and has been created to:

- improve access to free school meals in eligible high-poverty local education agencies and schools and
- eliminate the administrative burden of collecting household applications for free and reduced-price meals (these applications are not collected for participating campuses).

If your school district or charter school decides to use the CEP in the 2014–2015 school year, the CEP data your district or school reports to the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) will impact state compensatory education (SCE) funding for the 2015–2016 school year. The Texas Education Agency will use the count of students eligible for meals fully reimbursed by the TDA in the calculation of students eligible for SCE funding. Students whose meals are reimbursed at the “paid rate” will not be counted. For campuses not using the CEP, we will continue to determine SCE funding using TDA-provided prior-year counts of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunches, and counts from districts and charter schools using alternative reporting methods such as alternative basic monthly claims.

E Rate Calculation

- Your school can receive an E-rate discount of 20 to 90 percent depending on its location (in an urban or rural area) and the economic needs of your students. The level of economic needs is determined by the percentage of students eligible for the [National School Lunch Program \(NSLP\)](#).
- This information (location and economic needs) can be used to determine the school's discount by using the [E-rate Discount Matrix](#)(PDF).
- To calculate your school's E-rate discount, you must determine the percentage of students by school who are eligible for the NSLP. Eligibility criteria is based on whether or not a student's family falls within the income eligibility guidelines of NSLP. Eligibility is not based on a student's participation in NSLP.

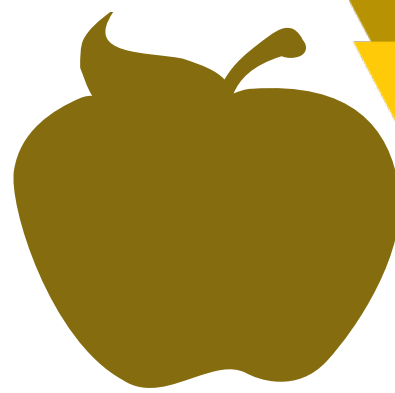

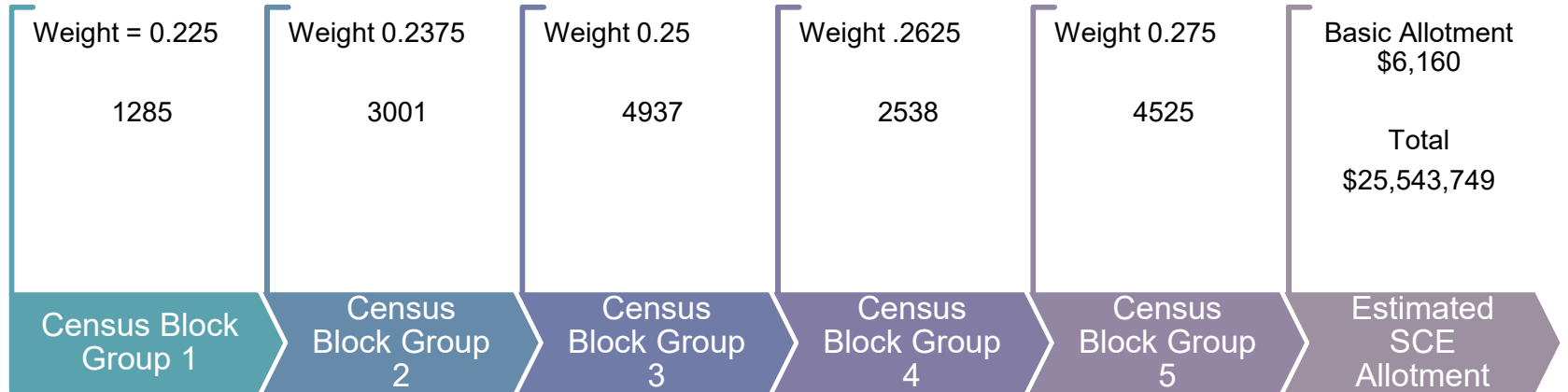
McAllen ISD NSLP Reimbursements

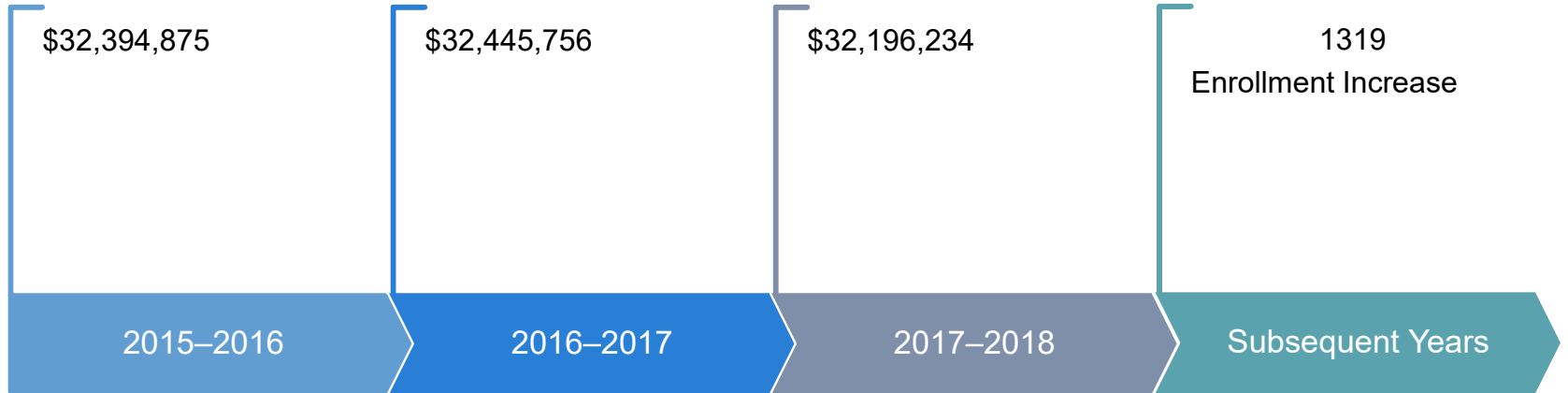

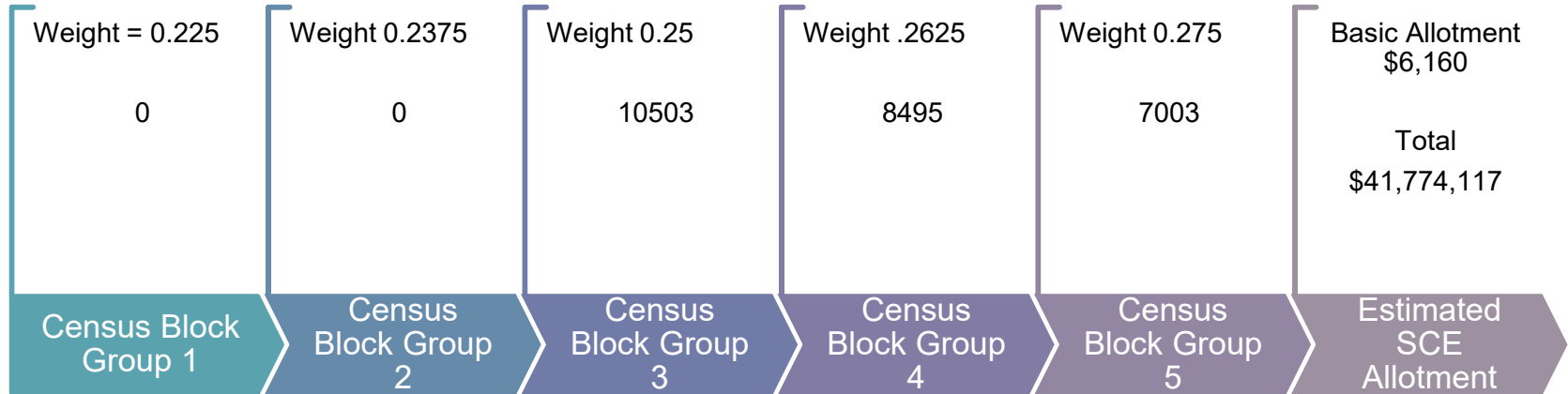

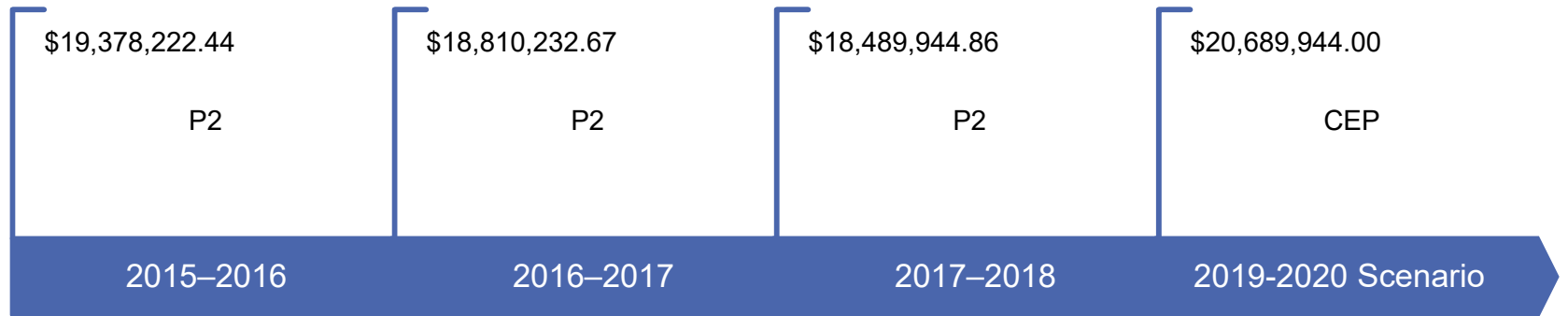
La Joya State Compensatory
