

The women of Iran are showing that they're powerful, no matter what the law says.

Meet Bahareh Hedayat. She is a 31-year-old activist for women's and student rights.

Bahareh is currently serving a ten-year prison sentence for speaking out against the violations of the rights of students following the 2009 presidential elections in Iran.

In addition to her activism on students' rights, she has also worked for improving women's rights as a member of the One Million Signatures campaign to change Discriminatory Laws Against Women (also known as the Campaign for Equality), for which she received a two-year suspended sentence.

Her fearless activism put her on the frontlines of a violent crackdown. Following the national elections in 2009, security officials stormed the student dormitories. Many students were beaten, arrested, and reportedly killed.

Bahareh was outspoken in demanding accountability from the government for these human rights violations. As a result, she was arrested for the third time on December 31, 2009, and sentenced to almost a decade in prison.

Bahareh has sacrificed her dream of starting a family, and now faces years in prison for the simple act of advocating for the rights of her fellow Iranians. Like many young Iranians, she strives for a just world that ensures the respect of rights of all people.





"Sadness and loneliness have no place in my heart because our empathy for each other is untainted ... There is no doubt in my mind that [we have a] bright future; we will breathe in a free country while celebrating our liberty together. ## Background information: Women in Iran continue to risk their freedom and their lives for equality

Women in Iran face widespread discrimination under the law:

- They cannot take on key positions in the state. For example, they are not allowed to be judges or stand for the presidency.
- They do not have equal rights with men in marriage, divorce, child custody and inheritance.
- Criminal harm suffered by women is less severely punished than the same harm suffered by a man.
- Evidence given by a woman in court is worth half that given by a man.

## Campaign for Equality women's rights activists under attack

In 2006, Iranian women's human rights defenders courageously launched a powerful grassroots movement called The One Million Signatures Campaign – also known as the Campaign for Equality.

The Campaign demands an end to legal discrimination against women, and its members are careful to conduct their activities in full compliance with the law. They have travelled the country calling on all Iranians–both men and women-to sign a petition supporting an end to laws that discriminate against women.

The response of the Iranian authorities has been brutal and repressive. Women's human rights activists like Behareh Hedayat have served prison sentences simply for demanding equality. Other activists are regularly followed, harrassed and intimidated.


