AGC Priorities for Tax Reform

- Reduce Tax Rates for Corporations and Pass-Through Businesses
- Simplify the Tax Code
 - Repeal the Alternative Minimum Tax
 - Raise the Small Contractor Exemption
 - Increase the Availability of Cash Accounting
 - Eliminate Look-back Rules for Long-Term Contracts
- Promote Infrastructure Investment in the Tax Code
 - Co-Sponsor H.R. 960/S.326, the Public Buildings Renewal Act
 - Maintain Tax Exempt Status of Municipal Bonds
- Oppose Efforts to Increase Estate Taxes
 - Full repeal/step up in basis/no backsliding on \$5 million or indexing
 - 2704 Regulations





Infrastructure Investment


AGC is pushing to link tax reform and infrastructure investment

- Infrastructure enjoys broad bipartisan support and could help move tax reform through Congress
- Combining tax reform and infrastructure investment is a win for the economy
- A dollar invested in infrastructure provides greater economic output than tax cuts
- Tax reform and infrastructure investment are already connected
- Our nation's infrastructure needs are well documented

Infrastructure Investment

- Administration's Plan \$200
 Billion over 10 years
 - \$100 billion for local prioritization of projects
 - \$25 billion for rural infrastructure
 - \$15 billion for transformative projects
 - 1 million new apprentices
 - 8 Year reduction in permitting process







Key Components of a Tax and Infrastructure Package should Include:				
Surface Transportation		Solutions:		
Current Funding: Gap: Total Needs: AGC Solutions:	\$ 941 B \$ 1.1 T \$ 2.042 T \$ 264 B	Highway Trust Fund: Increasing the gas tax by 15 cents would raise \$240 billion over 10 years. Other user-related revenue options should also be considered. Private Activity Bonds (PABs): increasing the volume cap for transportation PABs by \$5 billion would result in an additional \$19 billion in investment of large transportation infrastructure projects.		
Electricity		Solution:		
Current Funding: Gap: Total Needs: AGC Solution:	\$ 757 B \$ 177 B \$ 934 B Permitting Reform	Federal funding is not a primary concern, as many electric/energy projects are funded with private dollars. However, significant delays in the environmental permitting process causes delays and increases costs. Conducting environmental reviews and permitting processes in a concurrent, rather than sequential manner as well eliminating duplicative consultations will help with delivering these projects in a faster and more cost efficient manner.		
Aviation		Solution:		
Current Funding: Gap: Total Needs: AGC Solution:	\$ 115 B \$ 42 B \$ 157 B \$ 25 B	Increase funding for the Airport Improvement Program and lift the \$4.50 cap on the Passenger Facility Charge (PFC). Raising the PFC to \$8.00 would raise \$25 billion over 10 years.		
Water / Wastewater		Solutions:		
Current Funding: Gap: Total Needs: AGC Solutions:	\$ 45 B \$ 105 B \$ 150 B \$ 71 B	Private Activity Bonds (PABs): Lifting the volume cap for water infrastructure unlocks up to \$6 billion in private investment. WIFIA: Provide \$200 million annually over 5 years for WIFIA loans to Clean and Drinking Water SRF's. This \$1 billion appropriation would generate \$65 billion in loans. Maintain Tax Exempt Status of Municipal Bonds: Eliminating the tax exempt status of municipal bonds would remove \$310 billion annually for state and local infrastructure.		






Key Components of a Tax and Infrastructure Package should Include:				
Inland Waterways / Ports		Solution:		
Current Funding: Gap: Total Needs: AGC Solution:	\$ 22 B \$ \$15 B \$ 37 B \$18 B	Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund/Inland Waterways Trust Fund: Ensure all user- generated revenue sources that support these trust funds are fully utilized for water infrastructure. This would raise \$18 billion over 10 years.		
Federal Buildings Fun	d	Solutions:		
Current Funding: Gap: Total Needs: AGC Solutions:	\$ 8.8 B \$ 4.6 B \$ 13.4 B \$ 5 B	Civilian BRAC: The disposal of unneeded federal real property would allow for billions of dollars in construction work. For example, GSA sold an abandoned heating plant in Washington, D.C., for \$19.5 million that will be converted into high-end condos, requiring more than \$100 million in private construction. Disposal of the property has the potential to generate \$8 billion through the sale of these properties. A-11 Reform: Modify outdated budget scoring policy and enable federal agencies to make infrastructure, real property and procurement decisions that unlock private sector investment. Private Activity Bonds (PABs): Expanding PABs to include additional types of public infrastructure would cost \$48 million over 10 years and result in \$5 billions of dollars of private investment.		
Additional Financing	and	Solution:		
Funding Sources AGC Solution:	\$ 371 B	Move America Forward Tax Credits/Bonds. Private sector purchasers would be allocated tax credits to attract private investment in public infrastructure. This proposal would turn \$8.1 billion cost into \$226 billion in bond authority.		
		Support additional funding and financing options that promote the construction of infrastructure at the federal, state and local levels. Including a one-time tax on U.S. Corporations' foreign earnings – repatriation –would raise over \$125 billion for infrastructure.

AGC Priorities for Environmental Permitting

AGC Message:

- Performing sequential and duplicative environmental reviews after the NEPA Record of Decision results in massive schedule, budget, and legal hurdles
- Merge the NEPA review process and the Clean Water Act Section 404 permitting process
- A reasonable and measured approach to citizen suit reform could prevent misuse of environmental laws










AGC Construction Workforce Shortage Survey











Programs to Address Workforce Shortage

Perkins CTE:

- \$1.1 billion state grant program that funds career and technical education
- Last authorized in 2006 and outdated for today's labor market needs; priorities include: alignment, collaboration and internships

Apprenticeship Executive Order:

- Executive Order 13801 would double federal funding and streamline registration approval
- Ensure construction industry is eligible for new apprenticeship programs

Additional Initiatives:

- JOBS Act would authorize Pell grants for short-term training programs
- BUILDS Act would provide training grants for in-demand skills
- Link infrastructure investment and job training





Prior Authorization


AGC Message:

- Federal Election law requires prior authorization for PAC solicitation and limits authorization to one trade association per year
- House passed appropriations amendment prohibiting FY2017 funds and recent omnibus (H.R. 3354) prohibiting FY2018 funds from being used to enforce requirement (a first step)

AGC Ask:

- Co-sponsor H.R. 2101, the Prior Approval Reform Act, which repeals the outdated and burdensome prior authorization requirement
- Block funds from being used to enforce requirement in appropriations bill
