ON A MISSION

- Coined and defined “Open Source” to crystallise the promise of software freedom in the new internet era
- OSI Mission from 1999:
 - “The Open Source Initiative (OSI) is a non-profit corporation with global scope formed to educate about and advocate for the benefits of open source and to build bridges among different constituencies in the open source community.”
- The first part of that mission has been more than addressed
 - Open source adoption global and dominant
 - A part of every corporate and government strategy
 - Biggest risk now is not obscurity but rather dilution
 - Thus still important work to be done
- The second part is OSI's next focus



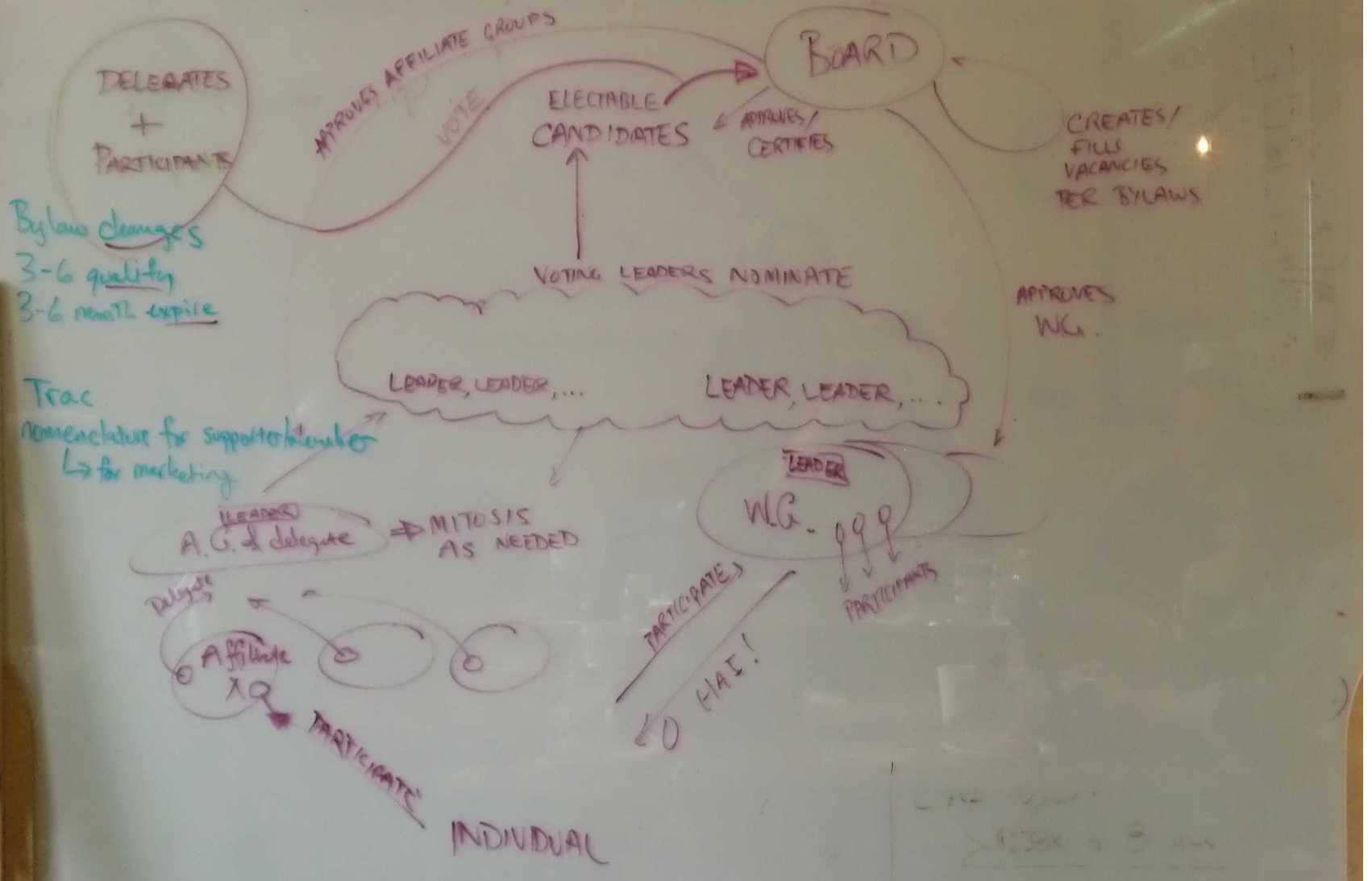
Governance Revision

- Started several years ago
 - Clear to the Board that renewal required
- Several attempts were not successful
 - Desire for community input
 - Formed a community of reference
 - But this is a task that the Board has to lead
- Board vision crystallised during 2010
 - More modest approach
 - Expected to evolve
 - First step: bring in stakeholders



Work In Progress...

Bring In Stakeholders

- OSI represents many kinds of entity:
 - Individuals
 - Open source software foundations
 - Ad-hoc open source communities
 - Centres of Competence of many kinds
 - Government bodies
 - Educational activities
- OSI also comprises working groups:
 - License Review
 - Education
 - Public Policy
 - Legal Affairs
 - and more
- Keen to draw all the threads of the open source fabric



OSI Directors

- Currently OSI is purely a ten-person Board, by design
 - Bylaws explicitly assert there are no members of OSI
 - Board elects volunteers to vacancies
 - Board reserves all powers
 - Board receives recommendations from working groups
- Board recently enacted term limits to encourage renewal
- Board aims to fill future vacancies by public elections
 - Create a candidate “pool” from the various Schemes/Groups
 - All participants in Schemes and Working Groups vote
 - Needs to be safe from “regulatory capture”
 - Detailed rules TBD



Affiliates

- Board seeks to create Affiliate programmes during 2011
 - Hopefully to elect replacements for Director vacancies
- Bylaws will eventually be changed to make formal whatever works
- Initial Affiliate programmes to design:
 - Open Source foundation Affiliates
 - Organisational Affiliates
- Future programmes with more limited governance role:
 - Corporate Advisory Board
 - Personal Affiliate Scheme



Working Groups

- The Working Groups are core to OSI's mission
- Board wants them involved in governance
- Proposal is to include their elected chairperson in the Director pool
- Exact rules still TBD.



Process And Timeline

- Board drafts vision: 2010 (completed at OWF, Paris)
- Volunteer “Governance Group” formed: 4Q 2010
- Board specifies first steps: March 2011
- Governance Group convening on list, establishing infrastructure: Now
- Open Source Foundation Affiliate Scheme: OSCON 2011
- Working Groups Scheme: 3Q 2011
- Organisational Affiliate Scheme: OWF 2011
- Corporate Advisory Board: End of 2011
- Personal Affiliate Scheme: In parallel with the above
